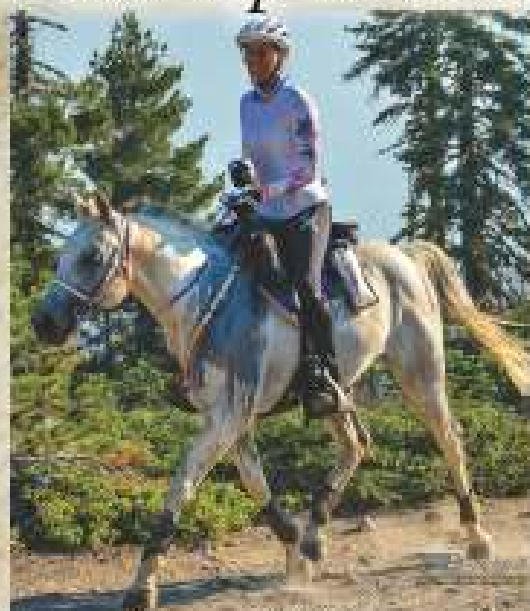

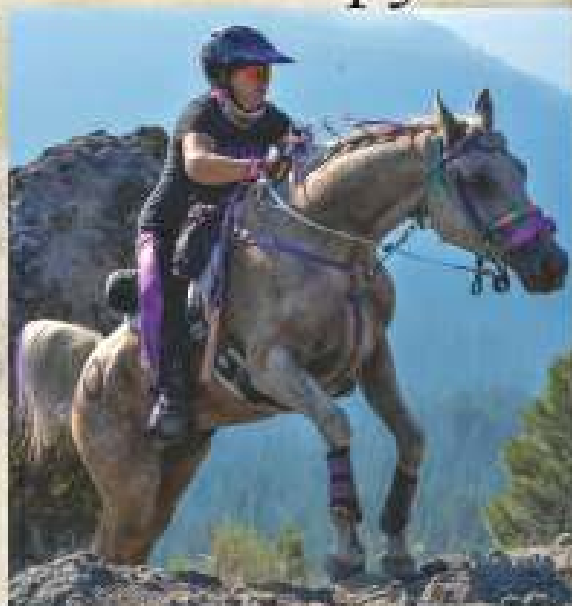

4-H Junior Rider Year End High Point Award: Just for Juniors

Are you a 4-H member? Know someone who is? Encourage your friends to do competitive trail rides. They and you can compete against each other to win NATRC's 4-H Year-End High Point Award.

To be eligible is simple. Just compete in any division, nominate yourself, and prove that you are a 4-H member! Here are the specifics:

1) The award goes to the high point horse and rider team **regardless** of the division.
2) Your self-nomination must occur before the end of the ride year which is the second Sunday in November. (For 2019, that will be November 10th).

3) You must: (a) be an NATRC competing member, (b) contact Sarah Rinne at natrc@natrc.org to nominate yourself, and (c) have your 4-H leader contact Sarah to verify that you are a 4-H member.

Additionally, in a number of states (Colorado is one example), 4-H now recognizes competitive trail as an activity that qualifies as a 4-H member's project. How cool is that? A form to use for documentation at the ride is available [here](#) or contact Sarah Rinne, natrc@natrc.org.

Champions Among Us

Barbara Jagoda

Former Competitor Turned Racehorse Trainer Turned Author

When I knew Barb, she was a science teacher and NATRC competitor. It was in the late 1970s and early 80s in Region 3. Like all of us, she has always had a tremendous love and passion for animals.

She rode a nice, leggy dark chestnut half-Arab gelding she called Brandy. They were an unbeatable team in Open Lightweight. Barb seemed impervious to the rigors of distance riding. To me, a newbie, it appeared that she never sweated, never had a hair out of place, was never in a hurry, was always easy with a smile, and never got dirty.

One of the highlights of my early years of competing was when I actually won first in horsemanship in Open Lightweight, and Barb won second. She and Brandy were GOOD, and it had taken me a long time to achieve her kind of excellence! As one would expect, in later years she served as a judge.

In January, some 30 years later, Barb contacted Sarah Rinne about

donating some proceeds from her book to NATRC. A book! I had to know more. Turns out she had been very busy. She wrote a book about her experience in taking an insecure, unruly ranch pony, Smokey, from the Pawnee Grasslands of NE Colorado and guiding him into an Arabian racing legend. As her website says, she recounted this story "... for all the unfortunate horses who have never found that special person in their lives and who often, through no fault of their own, ended up at a merciless, dead-end auction ..."

Barb told me, "If you can imagine, I had absolutely no training as a racehorse trainer, yet Smokey went on to break almost every imaginable record in the Arabian Horse Racing books. He raced in an amazing 120 races (all at the top level of competition) over an amazing 10 years. He won 50 of those races and placed first, second or third in 100 of them. He set track records at every distance from 4-1/2 furlongs to 1-1/2 miles in California, Colorado,

Kentucky, Arizona, Wyoming and Montana. He was fondly called the One-eyed Wonder, the Disney Horse, the Colorado Invader and the Cinderella Horse. All this in spite of losing his right eye early in his racing career."

She went on to say in a heartfelt email, "I really can't thank NATRC enough for what it taught me. And I'm sure Smokey would thank you too. He literally was hanging by a thread with all that potential masked by unruly behaviors that no one wanted to deal with. Thank goodness I happened to be at the right place at the right time. What Smokey was able to overcome and eventually accomplish was largely due to the teamwork skills (horse and rider) that I learned while competing in this sport."

Smokey, who passed away in 2016 at 30, was one of the lucky ones. His story proves, like so many others have, that given a chance, any horse, even unwanted ones, can achieve great things.

2018 Jim Menefee Lifetime Achievement Award

Mike W. Bridges, DVM - Region 5

Plaque Sponsored by NATRC

“We’ve caught another fish, boys.” were the first words Mike heard as he approached Dr. Larry Bentley and volunteers at an NATRC competition in 1977. The following weekend, it was on to the Brickhouse Campground in Sumter National Forest and Mike’s first competitive ride with NATRC.

Mike ultimately rode over 5,000 miles, obtaining several National Championships on various Arabian mounts during the course of his competitor journey. Mike is probably the only competitor in NATRC’s history to begin a competition with 50 points being deducted from his horsemanship card. His dear friend, Horsemanship Judge Mary Britt, penalized him for riding without a girth. Undeterred, he pursued the finish line, knowing that bonding with both horse and fellow competitors was the true reward.

It was at an NATRC competition that Mike met Polly Johnson, and as a result, a respected team of both horse and horsemanship judges was formed. This husband and wife team continued until Polly’s untimely death in 1982. The Polly Bridges Award was established as a memorial to her influence and dedication to the sport and continues to be a coveted national award.

Mike has worn many hats over his years supporting NATRC. He managed and judged the Edgemont CTR held in the Pisgah National Forest for over two decades. The Edgemont CTR was formidable and thought to be the toughest ride in Region 5. Reliving those days, flight or fight tales are still shared around campfires. With Mike judging, he and Mary Britt co-managed the very first Kings Mountain State Park CTR. At that ride, he always

donates his judging fees back to the organization. For Mike, it has always been about the love of the sport and NATRC family, not the monetary gains.

Mike has used his many talents throughout the years – first as a volunteer, then a competitor, ultimately becoming a veterinary judge – all the while believing strongly in NATRC’s philosophies. He has served on the Judges Committee and has been active in helping develop the criteria for the CRI being implemented now. He also helped to create the very first modern score cards used in NATRC.

Dr. Bentley was never more right when he said, “We’ve caught another fish, boys.” Forty years later, he’s still on the line, and our sport and organization have been the beneficiaries of his dedication and participation.

Mike’s Acceptance Speech

We all like to remember how we got involved in NATRC. Here, briefly, is my story.

In 1977 I didn’t know what NATRC was, but I was aware of long distance trail riding. I was an avid reader of *The Western Horseman* magazine, which often had articles about long distance rides. One night in October, I read in the back of the magazine in the Coming Event section about an endurance ride being held near Tryon, NC, on Glassy Mountain, only an hour or so from my house in Collettsville, NC, in the Pisgah National Forest. I thought that would be a good opportunity to find out what it was all about.

So, Saturday morning of the ride I hopped in my truck, and drove to the Glassy Mountain Campground, only to find it completely empty, of course. Everyone had left with the horses. So

after cruising through, I headed for the exit to go back home. That’s when coincidence, fate, or whatever, changed my life’s path.

As I was heading out the campground gate, heading toward home, in came the ride manager. He had forgotten something. He asked me if he could help me (maybe I looked suspicious). I said, “Yes,” and explained to him that I had come to observe the ride. He said that no one comes to observe without helping, and to follow him up to the vet check where everyone was. I followed him up to the top and got out of my truck.

The first thing I heard was a big voice that could be heard from “glen to glen and down the mountainside.” The voice belonged to a schoolmate of mine and a popular AERC vet and NATRC judge, Dr. Larry Bentley, who was well known for his loud sonorous



voice. The first thing out of his mouth was, “Well, it looks like we caught another fish!” It seems he was right.

Two weeks following that ride was an NATRC ride at (Continued on [page 7](#))

Brick House Campground. He invited me to that one. I drove down to that, and then to the next which was a three-day NATRC ride at Rockmart, Georgia, where I had the opportunity to help Dr. Bentley judge the Novice division. (Things were more relaxed back then). By then I had totally swallowed the hook, and had met many folks who became my life time friends - Danny Herlong, Richard Stone, Bill Sherfess, Charlie Crider, Mary Britt, Polly Johnson Bridges, just to name a few.

Before winter I had bought a little Arab mare named Raf la Coree at the Bristol Arabian horse sale and had called Mary Britt, one of my newfound friends, who became my mentor as she has been mentor for many of us riders through the years before the term "mentor" was used. We rode everywhere that winter, from Cataloochee to Pisgah. By April, 1978, I thought Raffy and I were ready to enter the Lake Jordan Ride in eastern NC judged by Dr. A. B. Blanton and Mary Britt. Raffy got third place in Open Divi-

sion. However, I don't remember taking a ribbon home in horsemanship. No matter, I was in the NATRC family.

Through the years I have been indebted to many folks; to management and volunteers who have given me trails to ride; who have hired me to judge; and who have helped me when I have managed rides; to the judges with whom I have judged, and who have judged me, inspiring me to be a better rider and horseman; to the riders who have ridden with me and enriched my life, and who have graciously and patiently allowed me to judge them; and to the NATRC organization, filled with folks with high skills and high ideals, who have made me proud and honored to receive this award.

Thank you all.

Chuck Edwards – Region 6

Chuck Edwards has been a dedicated NATRC volunteer for over four and a half decades; his love for our organization is palpable. He brought NATRC to the Midwest by not only traveling to Colorado with a small group of friends to find out what this interesting sport entailed, but also then returning to Nebraska to put on what is now our oldest active NATRC ride in Region 6, Indian Cave.

As a testament to his dedication and passion for that ride, he built the park trails to hold the event. Under Chuck's direction, Indian Cave has

run continuously over those same trails for 45 years. Chuck takes his trail master duties very seriously and does all he can to keep riders safe and on track. He also managed the ride for many years - doing it all! To this day, he still maintains those trails and can be found out there clearing, marking and wheeling any changes in mileage. While Chuck is a vital part of R6, it is interesting to hear his stories of our days



as a part of R4, before R6 was created.

As one of the founding members of the Nebraska Endurance and Competitive Trail Ride Association (NECTRA) in 1974, he built a great support for NATRC rides and a means to work together to put on events, educational activities, and give new and existing members a place to belong. Chuck rarely misses a meeting, giving valuable input and providing an important link to our long history. Currently Kim is chair of the drug testing committee. Her history of

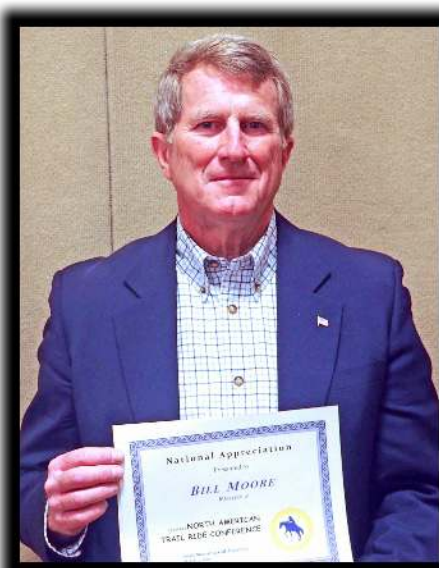

NATRC Student Loan & Scholarship Program

Student loans and scholarships are available according to the amount budgeted by the National Board of Directors. Full-time students who have been members, or whose families have been active members, for at least three years receive preference. Those members active more than six months are also considered.

The Student Loan/Scholarship Committee will give first priority to students enrolled in accredited schools of veterinary medicine; second in studies leading to a degree in Animal Science, Nutrition, Health or other related equine field; third in other related equine studies; fourth to college students in their senior year, then junior year, sophomore year, freshman year. For a student loan, students enrolled in other studies may be considered.

The committee also considers financial need, scholastic achievement, and character of the applicant.

Loan repayment is in monthly installments at an annual interest rate of 3% and begins within six months following graduation or when recipients cease to be full-time students.

NATRC is a competitive trail riding discipline that has three divisions: The Novice and Competitive Pleasure of the horses and a homesteading judge evaluates the soundness, fitness, manners and trail abilities of the horses over long distances. NATRC's philosophy is about training and conditioning the best trail horse possible with a strong focus on teaching.

Thank you Louis and Cathy for all you have done for Region 3 this year! We are fortunate to have you among us, and we look forward to future rides and memories with you both!

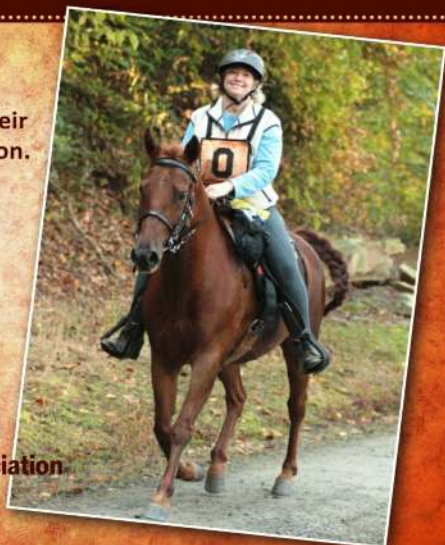

Acceptance Speech by Victoria Whitehead

Thank all of you for coming to this meeting to celebrate all of our accomplished horses and riders in NATRC.

I do not accept this award just for Grace and me. I accept it for my whole family: my family at home, Zeb and Zayne, my NATRC family, and my barn family. For without ALL of you, the challenges and the high level of competition, Grace and I could not have achieved this. I am overwhelmed by the respect shown to me and Grace, and I want you to know how much I love and respect you in return. The trek to get to this podium has taken a few twists and turns along the way, but at least one of you has always been there to support, encourage or remind me why we do this. For this, I thank you!

I named my mare "By the Grace of God" as soon as she made it to my farm. Her name has significance because of my core belief in God and what He has brought into my life. The joys. The sorrows. The obstacles, or should I say "opportunities"? The challenges. And of course you, my family.

I found her by the grace of God in February 2011, forgotten

and neglected in a pasture with very little grass and no hay. She was an almost 2-year old walking skeleton. She was so emaciated that when I went to catch her, she didn't even bother walking away. I convinced the owners to let me carry her home to put weight on her. But when I got her home and realized the extent of her condition, I could not in good conscience send her back. I had many "interesting" discussions with them, and with a few dollar bills changing hands, I officially did not have to return her.

For the first 3 years, we worked on trust with lots of groundwork. Then after 6 weeks under saddle, and even though she was still VERY spooky, I decided to try her at an NATRC competition - her first and only my second competition. One must practice what they preach, and the only way to get better is to push yourself a little bit past your comfort zone. I had no REAL expectations at that point. My thoughts were, "Just Do It!" and go from there.

"Twas grace that taught my heart to fear, and grace my fears relieved."

Whereas that first competition with her should have deterred me, it was actually in the face of this failure that I felt I needed to show my grit. My daddy always told me that when I fall, I should hurry and get up so I don't break something because spirits are easily broken on the ground, and it is the act of getting up that gives us strength. I realized NATRC was exactly what both this filly and I needed to strengthen our spirits.

On the Friday before check-in, we went out for a "leg stretcher" ride, and Grace spooked at a (Continued on [page 33](#))

horse running up behind her as she was going down a small hill. I ungracefully fell off, landing funny and breaking my wrist. That was the first time I had ever broken a bone in my body. As I stood in line for vet-in talking to people, I asked this nice guy if he thought they would take into consideration that I was injured. He just looked at me and smiled. "You just do what you can do. Trust yourself and trust your horse. By the way, I'm the horsemanship judge, Kim Cowart." All I could do was shake his hand and laugh.

On Saturday, she spooked at another horse coming up behind her through the scrub, and again I had an ungraceful dismount. In her defense, he did sound like a freight train or a bear coming through the forest.

On Sunday, she spooked at a sign for the Open riders just a mile outside of camp. And let me tell you, I have never been so thankful for the deep sand in Florida. As I hollered, "Rider down," Cindy Keen came up behind us and said, "Really Victoria? We are within the 2-mile marker. You couldn't have waited until we got back into camp before getting off? We're almost there! Shake that sand off and let's go." I simply laughed, jumped back on Grace, and we all walked into camp together. I believe someone started calling me "1-A-Day." A few days after I got home from this ride, I received a note from Kim that meant so much to me and made me realize what an amazing family I had found in NATRC.

Everyone that loves this sport has those kinds of stories. We could go around the room, horror tales, funny stories and thoughtful moments shared by the campfire. And THAT is what makes all of you, all of us, special. Tonight, I get the privilege of being here with you, my NATRC family, in my moment of celebration. It is why I love NATRC so much. When we compete, we are not just creating a partnership with horses but also with each other. That partnership is what gives us courage in other aspects of our lives. This first ride was not my only set back. There were SO many more. I firmly believe it is not what happens to us that makes the difference, but how we react.

"How precious did that grace appear the hour I first believed."

My reaction to one of God's greatest yet unplanned gifts was to keep on keeping on. Due to having a "biscuit" in the oven, because southern women don't have buns, my riding was very limited in 2016. So, I volunteered at every ride I could attend until right before my due date. When he did come, we were overjoyed to finally meet him. Then every mother's worst nightmare happened.

They took him from me and explained that he would need to be

flown to Children's Hospital in Birmingham for multiple surgeries in the next few days. It took every ounce of strength I had to not crumble to the floor right then. Over the next few months, my strength and courage was tested repeatedly, and every time I thought I couldn't handle any more, my NATRC family came to my rescue.

I received phone calls, texts, cards and even handmade quilt ornaments. We were visited in the hospital and were even brought dinner since food for us was the last thing on our minds. Your outpouring of love and support bolstered me and helped me realize that I wasn't alone. That my family was always there for me as I am for you.

"The Lord has promised good to me. His word my hope secures; ..."

As I have gotten older, I have realized that I am a goal-oriented person. I NEED something to look forward to and motivate me. However, I have also learned that life in general is about managing expectations. My goal for 2018 was not the President's Cup. My goal was to do my personal best and get a National Championship for my sweet mare before I started competing her son, Casteal.

Well, I was able to achieve that goal by April 22 at the Carolina Derby. When the mid-year national standings came out, I was stunned. Grace and I were both at the top of the list! I have never been one of those hard-core competitors, riding for points and glory. My competition has always been within myself. Do MY Best, have fun while I'm doing it, and the rest will work itself out.

When my fellow competitors, Esther Diaguila, Sally Kudra and Alice Perryman, among many others, were telling me to "Go for it!", I never imagined that Grace and I could actually accomplish it. But since we had already achieved my 2018 goals, I decided that I would continue to ride Grace the rest of the year and do what we could do. Why not raise the bar and shoot for the moon? We might just land among the stars!

Each of the rides in 2018 brought unique "opportunities," and those opportunities highlighted the good sportsmanship

and camaraderie found in our sport. It is not just about competition but family and supporting one another. There are three examples I would like to share with you tonight that are good representations of our NATRC family and why I have embraced this sport and the people in it. They are far from the only ones. However, I don't think there would be enough time, or attention span, to share ALL of them tonight.

"I once was lost, but now am found ..."

The first one occurred at Carolina Derby when the entire ride followed the trail markers that evidently were mixed up, and we went 3 miles off trail in the wrong direction. We were an hour behind, not just (Continued on [page 34](#))

max time, but Completion Only time with 6 miles to make up. So we had to boogie just to make it back to camp within the competitive window.

After we realized our mistake and turned around, informing Novice and CP riders as we passed them, we took off in the right direction. I discovered, after Grace slipped going around a curve, that (1) I will always have bucking rolls on my saddle; (2) your piri-formis was not designed to hold your entire body weight as you gallop through the forest; and (3) Open competitors are not as mean and cut throat as I was once led to believe.

In this case, the entire Open Division helped each other by swapping out the leader to get us back to camp, with Tommy Mitchell hollering "Go squirrel, GO!" We waited for each other at the watering holes and made sure everyone was doing OK at the pace that was being set. Needless to say most of us made it in to camp with seconds to spare. **#Teamwork.**

"Through many dangers, toils and snares ..."

The second was at Virginia Highlands when, after a rushed exit from home, I realized I had forgotten Grace's boots. She didn't have shoes, and Virginia Highlands is NOT barefoot friendly. To complicate this trip, Sara Baldwin and I had a traumatic drive up. Not only did my air conditioning go out in the middle of June in the South, but I blew one tire on the way up and had to replace two more tires with manufacturer defects at the camp ground.

My family rallied again. Sara was a fantastic one-armed cheerleader during the first tire change on the side of the highway. The Nunn family contacted another NATRC friend who owned a local tire shop and who got my truck and trailer road worthy. As to Grace being barefoot, Cindy Keen and Marsha Howard scoured the campsite looking for something to help her. They located Patty Bass and Angie Lindberg who made sure I had Grace's feet "covered." I have written an article for our Region 5 Newsletter detailing this a little more, but long story short - I couldn't have done it without my family.

"... And grace will lead me home."

The third was at Broxton Bridge. As a previous high school teacher and swim team coach, I am COMPELLED to constantly encourage others around me to expand their horizons. "A person can only grow as much as his horizon allows." (-John Powell). This could be as simple as eating something besides chicken fingers and French fries. So during our down time at a previous ride, I encouraged Bobby Fields, a 1-day Novice rider to "step up his game." I asked him how he and his horse felt after the 1-day ride. With his quiet quirky little smile, he said, "Like he's ready for another go."

I guess I was VERY convincing because he not only stepped up to a 2-day, but to an Open 2-day! Bobby rode with Esther and her horse, Dana, who took very good care of him. Unfortunately, on day 2, Esther made that hard decision to pull Dana, who just didn't seem herself. Bobby and Roany rode with another group and did fine until the last 5 miles. My group came up on Bobbie as he was waving people by. I sent my group on while Ben and Ruby, and Grace and I stopped to find out what was wrong.

Turns out his go-go juice was gone-gone. Grace and Ruby shared their Delytes cookies with Roany,

which if you know Ruby, cookies are like gold. The cookies seemed to perk him up. So we walked for a bit to the next water stop to let the horses drink long and deep. We all made it back safely, and I didn't think about it again until the awards ceremony when Bobby's horse placed first ahead of Grace!

We all laughed about me and Ben helping Bobby beat us, but then Bobby stood back up said, "This was my first Open ride. Victoria and Ben showed me today what it means to be NATRC family. Roany was whipped. They stopped their ride to take care of us, and we wouldn't have done this without them." I remember telling him with grateful tears in my eyes, "That is what families do."

"Bright shining as the sun ..."

As the 2019 year begins, you will notice that I am not riding Grace in Open. You will still see her name though. Grace has turned into such an amazing mare that I have decided to share her with a junior rider who does not have a horse of her own.

Alora is riding Grace in CP Junior while I am riding Grace's son, Casteal, in CP so I can mentor her. Once I have legged up Casteal, you may see both of us in Open again. I'm pretty sure one of Alora's goals is to ride Grace in Open, and one of my goals is to help her reach hers.

"We've no less days to sing God's praise than when we first begun."

You may have noticed the theme running throughout my speech. They are stanzas of the song, "Amazing Grace" that we sing during our rides every Sunday. We sing this for many reasons. We sing this to remind us where we are, where we have been, and where we are going. We sing this together because we are family.

And family cares about one another. They pick you up when you are down. They give you the courage and strength to endure. They bolster you to stand your ground in the face of adversity. They push you to be the best possible you. And they are there to celebrate with you when your hard work is realized. Thank you for being a part of my family, and thank you for sharing with me in this celebration of my "Amazing Grace."

abeth, I sure hope not. Why?" And she replied, "Because I want to watch you try to stay on again. That was really funny."

Humor in the form of my southern accent has followed me all over the country. It is not intended humor, but rather unintended as folks try to figure out what I'm saying. I always thought I spoke normally, however NATRC has reminded me that, no, I don't sound like everybody else.

At a ride in Florida, I had stopped riders on trail to check tack, ask if they had a map, knife and hoof pick. I just really wanted to chat with everyone and see how they were doing. One particularly new rider rode up and I asked her my list of questions. She looked at me very puzzled. She was patting her pockets and looking around. In a flustered voice she said, "I am sorry, Mr. Cowart, but I just don't usually carry one of those on my horse." Now it was my turn to look puzzled, until we determined she thought I was asking to see a "toothpick" when I said "hoof pick."

I even got to check off a bucket list item at Colorado Trail last year. Being a southern boy I am accustomed to bright and rich fall colors from our varied hardwoods. However, I have long had a love for aspens and their golden spectacle and had wished for an opportunity to walk a path amongst the gold. Having mentioned this at the ride, the ride secretary Amelia took it to heart and made it her mission for me to get some gold.

Immediately after awards, she whisked me away to the nearest pass where there were reports of "peak aspen color!" Time was short as the day was ending, but we managed to walk some of the Colorado Trail among peak aspen before we lost the light, and I think I looked like something between the proverbial kid in a candy store and an awestruck tourist. One of the pics I took was of a winding trail through the aspen, the kind that makes you think "what's just around that bend?" It's a screen saver on my computer at work and every day I look at it and remember.

A quote from Mark Twain says it well for me. "Travel is fatal to prejudice, bigotry, and

narrow mindedness." Probably the greatest blessing of being a judge has been my expanded view of NATRC through travel to the other regions. There was a time that for me NATRC was mostly Region 5. Those are the folks I know best and am closest to.


However, the travel and friendship opportunities afforded me from judging has been a big reminder that NATRC is a widespread organization,

NATRC National BOD Minutes March 7, 2019, Reno, NV

CALL TO ORDER by President Angie Meroshnekoff, 8:01 a.m. March 7, 2019.

Welcome by Lory Walls to the 2019 Convention.

ROLL CALL. Sarah Rinne, Angie Meroshnekoff, Jamie Dieterich, Bob Insko, Mary Jo Malone, Bill Wingle, Laurie DiNatale, Gayle Muench, Alice Perryman, Bill Moore, Esther Diaguila. Guests Kim Cowart, Fran Muench, John Zeliff, Karen Kafka, Beni DeMattei, Laurie Knuutila, Patsy Conner, Wayne Tolbert, Victoria Whitehead, Kris Gray, Chris Heath, Gene and Vicki Boicelli, Kay Gunckel, Chuck Edwards, Diane Wingle.

MINUTES. November 10, 2018.

Motion by Muench, second by Parys to approve the minutes. Motion carried.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT. Meroshnekoff reported many organizations are struggling like ours. The public in general is moving away from animals, and younger people are not getting as involved. We are not alone.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT. Rinne. Update on new website progress and Leisure Division (LeD) development.

TREASURER'S REPORT. Muench. Nothing additional to discuss on the financials, and no significant changes since our conference call meeting in December. The marketing director has been released from the contract. We did get our value out of her work on the website. We are changing direction and seeking a new resource.

BY-LAWS & RULES. Parys. Reminder that there is a moratorium on rules as we are still working on the restructuring and development, and that the timeline for rule proposals has changed. Proposals are to be submitted in November, with wording adjusted in February and vote for approval or denial in July. Time wise the previous schedule just wasn't conducive to getting everything updated prior to the first November rides. The by-laws need updating to reflect the new membership structure. Wingle addressed the proposal and the need to adjust the language to reflect "current" membership as opposed to "paid up" membership. Dieterich stated it is a valid concern and that it is an indirect byproduct of the new free

memberships. Dieterich talked about having a separate LeD rulebook in the future and a better way of presenting only necessary rules to reduce confusion.

POLICIES & PROCEDURES. Dieterich. The board needs to address the national 4-H award and whether it should include the LeD competitors. Wingle believes we should allow LeD riders to be eligible as we need to be more inclusive and offer more awards. **Perryman made a motion to include LeD riders in 4-H award; Wingle seconded. Motion carried. Dieterich abstained.** Parys asked about breed awards. **Perryman moved to accept LeD competitors in breed award eligibility.** Breed awards are only a horse award, and since LeD is combined horse and horsemanship, it would not fit the general criteria. Perryman withdrew her motion.

PROTEST. Lori Allen. No protests. **PLANNED AND CHARITABLE GIVING.** Cowart. No new information. Insko discussed a program about donated vehicle sales to benefit nonprofits. Meroshnekoff asked Insko to share the link with the board.

NATIONAL HISTORIAN. Conner. Addressed the boxes with the historical documentation. Still in progress but on hold until the files can get to Conner. Conner is working to create a complete electronic history of ride documents.

RIDE SANCTIONS. Conner. 54 rides on the calendar. 38 of the rides are sanctioned. Old forms are still being used. Sending reminders to ride managers about submitting 6-week progress reports; they aren't always getting them done in time. Conner doesn't think we should use the word "confirmed" on website, and that we should use "reserved" instead regarding the date for rides not yet sanctioned. It also has a tab to register which is not allowed if the sanction is not complete. Conner discussed LeD regarding sanction timeframes (90 day minimum) and referred to the rule that it must be post-marked 90 days prior to the ride. It originally had to do with getting to national in time, then to the sanction chair, then into *Hoof Print* all via mail. Now that everything is electronic and can be done fairly quickly, that time frame is obsolete. A reminder that

rides hold a "reserved" date until January 31 of the new year for the same weekend of the previous year's ride. After that it can be taken by another ride.

CLINIC SANCTIONS. Linda Clayton. Report filed.

MANAGEMENT. Elaine Swiss. No report filed.

RULES INTERPRETER. Wingle. Wingle shared an update on Rules Interpreter reports to date and is only missing two reports at this time. One accident was shared where a rider fell and broke her hip in camp (not off of a horse), and no alcohol was involved. Dieterich stated we had talked about revising the form and asked if that was still being done. Wingle stated yes and Dieterich asked to assist. Parys suggested that we need to add entry lines for emergency contact info on our waivers. The need to report all accidents, even if non-injury and medical care refused was discussed.

INSURANCE. Rinne. No updates.

SAFETY. Swiss. No report filed.

MARKETING. Gray. The marketing contract with Lori Beck was dissolved. The marketing committee has had two meetings to address next immediate steps. Facebook marketing options and the cost associated with them were addressed. Gray addressed Google ad words and phrases we could buy to draw more hits on our website. Gray has some quotes coming in for that. Muench discussed the Trailmeister contract. The committee recommended that the Trailmeister contract not be renewed. There are a lot of Facebook opportunities at a very low cost. Gray doesn't believe that free memberships have been promoted or marketed well and would like to pursue that believing it is a good marketing tool. She talked about the new rider outreach program that R5 is using, and that they are sharing the plan with other regions.

SOCIAL MEDIA. Jonni Jewell. Report filed.

BUSINESS MODEL & MEASUREMENTS. Muench. No new information.

SPONSORSHIPS. Parys. Talked about the raffle and addressed the question if we want to continue the same raffle option next year. Wingle requested to get the (Continued on [page 40](#))

tickets earlier in the year to start selling sooner. Meroshnekoff stated it is a great benefit overall.

MEDIA ADVISORY. Dieterich. This is her last issue of *Hoof Print*. LeeAnn Dreadfulwater is set to take over for Jamie going forward. Because of convention the deadlines are shifted. If there is anything to submit, do it right away.

RIDERS AND JUNIORS. Cindy Keen. No report filed. Meroshnekoff stated this is a topic that is important to her. She is working with about ten juniors now. She believes we need to put a portion of our focus on our juniors and a committee member who can help promote, reach out and make contacts to 4-H groups and Pony Clubs in each region. We need someone to take this committee and grow it. Perryman volunteered to step in and take over.

FOUNDATION. Conner. We are missing some foundation minutes. Conner was asked where did the money come from and what it was for. She provided a document to the board to explain that. Dieterich stated there needs to be more documentation on the foundation and a better understanding by the board. Currently it is designated for an emergency, but what constitutes an emergency? The foundation board recommended Laurie Knuutila be the outside director replacement for Laurie DiNatale. Dieterich provided a by-laws clarification. **Muench made a motion to approve Laurie Knuutila to replace Laurie DiNatale on the Foundation board, Malone seconded. Motion carried.**

NATIONAL DRUG TESTING. Kim Murphy. Report filed. Looking to create a custom drug panel that tests more of what we want but stay within our budget.

VETERINARY DRUG COMMITTEE. Meroshnekoff. Tamara Gull, DVM, was appointed as the new chair. Keri Riddick, DVM, and Carrie Porter, DVM, were added to the committee.

TRAIL ADVOCACY AND GRANTS. Hanson. Reiterated the need to advocate for public trail by equestrian users.

EDUCATION. Dieterich. The focus is currently on educating judges on the new LeD. She also stated the Clinic Manual needs to be updated. The new font (Montserrat/Montserrat Alternate) is great, but is difficult to use. A template will be prepared for reports and letterheads.

MEMBERSHIP RECRUITMENT & RETENTION. Development Committee. No new information. The Ride Structure and Rules committee will resume meetings after national convention.

JUDGES. Cowart. Recommended committee members (Veterinarians) Pam Hess, DVM, Carrie Porter, DVM, Keri Riddick, DVM. (Horsemanship) Cowart, Nancy Kasovich, Lory Walls. (Rider Reps) Jonni Jewell, Marty Findley and Helen Smith. **Moved by Muench, seconded by Hanson to approve the committee selection. Motion carried.** Status of apprentices was shared in the report. The Judges Committee voted to advance Lori Allen from Apprentice to Provisional. Dieterich explained the requirements of provisional judging. Cowart addressed the LeD judging. Several applicants for LeD judging opportunities, and four have completed the test. Dieterich raised a concern about the \$35 non-member fee being too much for the LeD. Meroshnekoff suggested not charging a non-member fee for the LeD. **Moved by Muench to adjust the non-member fee to \$20 (from the current \$35) and member fee of \$10 for the LeD rides, seconded by Wingle. Motion carried.**

HALL OF FAME. Rinne. No applicants.

STUDENT LOAN/SCHOLARSHIPS. Gunckel. One new applicant for scholarship funds, Ryan Klamm. Started NATRC in 2013. Going into Grain & Food Science field. Gunckel recommended the approval of the scholarship. **Moved by Muench to approve a scholarship of \$2,000 for Ryan Klamm for the 2019/20 academic year, seconded by Moore. Motion carried.**

BREED & ORGANIZATION LIAISONS. Malone. Shared more information about the new program called The Right Horse Initiative that started in 2017. NATRC is now a professional partner. Malone is the NATRC liaison for RHI. The slogan used is "good people for good horses". There are 30 professional partners and 20 adoption partners to date. Their website is www.therighthorse.org. Lori Allen is going to sponsor a new award for NATRC for a high point rescue horse for the 2019 ride year.

AHA. Insko. Nothing to report.

BREED LIASON. Amy Martin. Breed awards are flowing in; Amy worked very hard to get the awards taken care of.

HONORARY & APPRECIATION. Ruth Mesimer. Report filed.

ANNUAL POINTS. Andrea Rogers/Rinne. No updates other than Phase II of the technology plan includes incorporation of the data component into the new website.

ELECTRONIC MEETING COORDINATOR. Rinne. Meroshnekoff reminded the board about Zoom online NBOD meetings the 1st Tuesday of each month. We are using Zoom for training the LeD judges. It was decided to upgrade the national Zoom account in order to add more users, one per each region (region presidents) plus judges co-chairs. (Presidents: R1 – Donna Stidolph, R2 – Audrey Pavia, R3 – Dayna Morgan, R4 – Kim Murphy, R5 – Bill Moore, R6 – John Zeliff).

CONVENTION. Dieterich. Reviewed the volunteer list for the booth. Help is needed for getting award items from guest rooms to the banquet room. Some silent auction items are in the hospitality suite. The hospitality suite is


